

ELCA SOCIAL STATEMENT: CIVIC LIFE AND FAITH

The church should not be preaching "politics" from the pulpit.

I have heard this concern expressed many times by individuals from multiple congregations, and it begs the question: How should the church address "politics", recognizing that "politics", the policies, structures, and laws of government, have a huge impact on every aspect of our lives and the lives of our neighbors?

How as Lutherans should we understand our relationship to civic life, including government, both as individuals and as a church body? After studying these questions for the past three years, a social statement task force of ELCA has posted a draft social statement on civic life and faith.
